The last meeting of the season drew a crowd of roughly 100 members and quite a few first-timers.

### Announcements

Patrick spoke briefly about his fight with cancer, and how the get well card and wishes helped him through his chemo ordeal, and wanted to emphasize how support of any kind means so much to someone undergoing cancer treatment. He advises that acrylic not be used for chemo caps as it doesn't breathe and gets very sweaty on a bald head.

The results are in—the Toronto Spiders took first place at the annual Back to Back International Wool Challenge. There were over 15 teams this year, so it was no small feat. The Spiders' final time was 5:52:48, shaving three minutes off of last year's time and besting the second place team from Australia by 40 minutes. Next year they hope to beat the world record of 4:51:14 set in 2004 by an Australian team.

The executive is looking to the membership for opinions regarding fundraising initiatives. Carole said the DKC is often approached for various causes, and they are considering setting aside 100% of the proceeds from the monthly raffle draw for charity.

Special Olympics Canada has set up a scarf program for the 2012 games. They are aiming for 2,500 scarves.

Catherine showed absolutely charming watermelon and blueberry baby hats complete with little stems. She says it was a great way to use up leftover sock yarn.

Gloria Williams brought five panels of an afghan from Knit One Below, still on the

needles but nearly complete. She noted that the panels are not overly stretchy and with panels alternating knit and purl, completely reversible.

### Guest Speakers

**Alisa McDonald and Tamara Krievins**  
"Stylish Knitted Skirts"

Both of our speakers have been crafting for years—spinning, knitting, weaving, and even macramé. Last year, they set out to research knitted skirts and address common problems associated with their construction and care (including the dreaded "bucket butt" phenomenon).

Though often avoided by knitters, skirts are actually great because the fit tends to be less 'fussy' and the structure is quite simple—it's basically an enormous sock with no heel to turn or toe to graft. Skirts are also perfect for trying out new stitch patterns and colour combinations.

The knitting research team identified some key characteristics that result in successful, flattering skirts. These include good fabric density, yarn with bounce, and a sturdy texture. When swatching, be on the lookout for these attributes. They also had good results from knitting with a two-stranded approach. This technique adds strength and structure, as well as allowing new and exciting colour combinations—for example, using two balls of Silk Garden sock yarn together (both the same colourway, but at different stages of the colour transition) gave excellent results.

Tamara finds that many of the problems encountered by her yarn store customers are the result of misinterpreting gauge and ball band information. She wants to reinforce the simple truth that if gauge cannot be achieved, yarn choice must be reconsidered!

The team's first skirt experiment was the **Lanesplitter**, from the Fall 2010 edition of

Knitty. One problem area in skirts is the waistband—they quickly discovered you don't want to bulk up this area. The team experimented with different waistbands, including stockinette and a sewn-in one. They also discovered that a bit of felting could tighten up a garment that turned out a little on the large side with good results.

The team also highly recommends the **Bell Curve Skirt**, also from Knitty (winter 2007). This is a skirt that's knit in the round with minimal finishing and hidden increases. The shape is a slight a-line with a flared hem, which flatters a variety of figures.

A few more tips from Tamara and Alisa:

- Use a light diffusion grid (the kind used in fluorescent fixtures) to drip dry garments right over the tub. These can be found at home improvement stores.
- Skirts can be washed with minimal stretching by using water and wool wash in a spray bottle. Place the skirt flat on your home-made rack over the tub, then spritz.
- A lining is unnecessary when worn with appropriate undergarments (hello, Spanx Half Slip).
- The best way to store knits without stretching is laying the garment flat. Underbed storage containers with lids (plus a little lavender or cedar) are ideal for this.
- Check out Trinny & Susannah's book *The Body Shape Bible* to find out what styles of skirts best flatter your shape.

## STITCH OF THE MONTH by Diane Martin

### Astrakan Stitch

Reverse Stocking Stitch background, Multiple of 4, plus 2 edge stitches

Row 1 & 3 (RS): Purl

Row 2: 1 border stitch, \*p3tog, then in the next stitch make 3 by (k1, p1, k1); repeat from \*, end with 1 border stitch.

Row 4: 1 border stitch, \*in the next stitch make 3 by (k1, p1, k1), p3tog; repeat from \*, end with 1 border stitch.

Repeat from Row 1.

If this stitch seems familiar, it is also known as: popcorn, trinity, blackberry and bramble.

When this stitch is worked in the round on a stocking stitch background, it is known as the spider stitch. The make 3 is done as p1,k1,p1.
